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## Accommodation

### Hotel Accommodation for Conference & Postgraduate Workshop Participants

The designated conference hotel is **Ibis Bangkok Siam 927 Rama 1 Road, Wangmai, Pathumwan, Bangkok 10330, Thailand** (near Chulalongkorn University, Pathumwan Princess Hotel and the National Stadium) which will be used for accommodation for most conference presenters.

Please note that we will be covering costs for two nights accommodation and breakfast only for paper givers not living within commuting distance of the venue. We will NOT be able to cover any additional printing, room service, local transport, etc. charges. Please ensure that you will cover them upon check-out. Rooms will be booked for arrival on Wednesday, 28 June, and departure on Friday, 30 June 2023. Please note that only these nights can be covered. It will not be possible for the organisers to pay for any other nights.

For papers that are co-authored and/or several authors attending the conference, only one set of costs will be covered. For example, if the paper presentation is shared between two authors, we will only be able to cover the costs of one person.

Unless arranged otherwise in writing with the conference organisers, a single room is booked for conference presenters. The single rooms cannot be used by two people. Postgraduate workshop participants will be allocated twin rooms (same-sex only). Any additional guests staying at the hotel must be registered and pay the costs at check-in. If any additional nights have been booked at your cost (and confirmed in writing by the conference organisers), these must be paid for at check-in.

*As you surely understand, the preparations for the conference have progressed and the EUSAAP had to make commitments to the hotel and other suppliers. If you have to withdraw from the conference now, you will be required to pay three nights of hotel accommodation. We appreciate your understanding and cooperation*

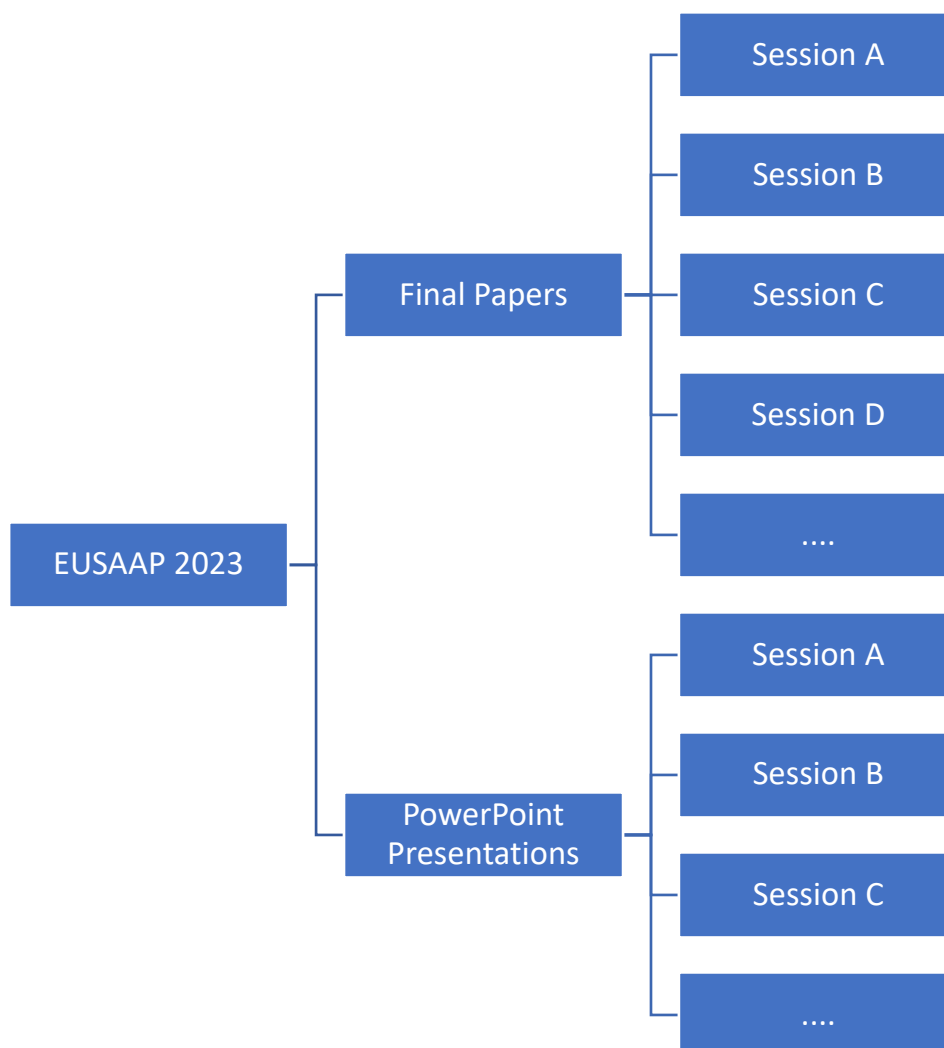
Due to technical limitations with the current EUSAAP website, conference papers will be collected via the conference Google drive.

## Local Travel and Information

### Travel to and from the Airport by Rail Link and BTS Skytrain

The ARL station is located at B1 FL of the airport. A journey from Suvarnabhumi Airport to downtown Bangkok takes half an hour and costs 45 Thai baht. The ARL operates daily from 05:30 to 24:00. The rail is used by regular Bangkok commuters and in high demand during the rush hours.

Participants should get off the ARL at Phyathai Station, which is the interchange station of BTS Skytrain. From Phyathai to National Stadium station, it takes 7 minutes and costs 28 baht. Board the BTS (direction Bearing) at Phyathai to get off at Siam and continue for one more station to National Stadium (end of Silom Line). Ibis Bangkok Siam is conveniently on one side of the station. Pathumwan Princess is connected to MBK, which is on the other side of the station.

### Visa, Travel and local Information

Please check early if you require a visa to visit Thailand. Visitors to Thailand need a valid passport and in some cases a visa to enter the country. Nationals of 57 countries are allowed to be in the country without a visa. Nationals of other 21 countries including China, India and Saudi Arabia are granted a visa on arrival, while the remaining need a visa in advance.

### Suvarnabhumi International Airport

Suvarnabhumi International Airport is a major international gateway to Asia. It is located in Samut Prakan Province, just 30 kilometres east of Bangkok. Suvarnabhumi — pronounced soo-WAHN-ah-poom, means 'golden land' in Thai.

Getting into Bangkok is easy with regular shuttle bus and airport taxi service. The recently opened Suvarnabhumi Airport Link provides direct train service into the terminal city station. Airport Express also provides four main direct bus services to various inner city hotels. A 24-hour public bus service is also provided from the Bus Terminal at the Transport Centre. Taxis can be found on Level 1 of the terminal. Alternatively, take a shuttle bus (Express route) to the Transport Centre taxi stand.

The Skytrain (BTS) is a monorail network with two lines going to popular destinations in Bangkok. One line stretches east to Sukhumvit Soi 77 at the On Nut terminus all the way north to Jatujak Park and the Northern Bus Terminal at the Mo Chit terminus. The other line

runs from National Stadium at MBK Shopping Centre south across to the west side of the Chao Praya River at the Wongwan Yai terminus. Individual ticket fares are available, as well as a continuous top-up card.

Bus lines are a very common form of transport for locals getting to work and around the city. The lines follow major traffic arteries that are often clogged with traffic. The bus routes aren't laid out in English, so find a Thai speaker to help out with getting from here to there.

MRT is Bangkok's subway system with two lines that run north to south and cover the eastern edge of the city that the Skytrain doesn't serve. Its northern terminus is Bang Sue Station in the Northern Bus Terminal/Jatujak Park area. Its southern terminus takes passengers to the edge of Chinatown (Yaowarat) at Hua Lamphong Station.

Taxis are readily available all over the city. Make sure the driver shows a working meter prior to the ride. Avoid touts offering a taxi service for a fixed fee, which is illegal and unsafe.
